## The Mikado Crowned Emperor—Yeddo Still Closed to Foreigners—A Heavy Loan Effected

SAN FRANCISCO, SUDGAY, Nov. 22.

Yokohama advices state that the Mikado, having attained his majority, has been crowned Emperor of Japan, at Kioto, and the Regency having ended, it was expected that he would leave Kioto for Yeddo. On the 21st of October a difficulty occurred in Yohohama between the Dutch efficers and Japanese authorities; the latter were forbidden to transact any business at the Custom-house for Dutch subjects. The matter was finally amicably set.led. Yeddo still remains closed to foreigners. It was expected that the opening of the city would not be costponed beyond the 1st of November. The event depended upon the result of the conference pending between the foreign Ministers and the reprethe Mikado. The Japanese Government has effected a loan of over halt a million of dollars from the Oriental Bank Corporation. 'Ine security is a lion on the Custom-house receipts. The Southern troops have also taken possession of Hakodadi, and forced NAMLEE, who held the place as a neutral, to retire. A number of persons seized the American steamer Augusta and compelled her to take them to a port in their own territory. The ship Mikado, employed in the bom-bardment of Nagati, had been wrecked, materially weakening the Southern fleet. The Imperial forces had invaded RIDGUA' (?) dominions from two direc. tions and were strongly intrenched before his Castle. The reduction of this stronghold would probably result in the general pacification of the North. The North German bark Iras had arrived at Kobe from Hamburg. She is the first yessel direct from Europe to that port. The United States steamer Oneida, the ram Stonewall, and several English, French and Dutch ships of war were at Yoko-Her Msjesty's ship Rattler was hama, Oct. 28. wrecked Sept. 24, on a reef near the Island of Soya la Peircuse in the Straits. The officers and crew were saved and brought to Yokohama by His Imperial Majesty's ship Duplex.
