Important Trenties Now Under Negotiation Result from Lewis Cass' Action.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 18— The new treaties Japan is negotiating are regarded in diplomatic circles as quite as important as the Chinese-Japanese war, as they will give for the first time official recognition to Japan as one of the sisterhood of civilized nations, capable of meting out justice and attending to the other functions of an opligational account.

A treaty similar to that with Great Britam is now being negotiated with this country and it is expected to be the second of new agreements to be sigued. Then will come a like treaty with Germany and other powers. The significant feature of this new series of treaties is that they entitle Japan to the same treaty rights as the countries of Europe or the Western Hemisphere. All of the Japanese treaties now existing treat it as a half barbarous country and are relies of the days prior to Japan's advance towards civilization in methods. The records of the State Department show that the United States was the first country to make a treaty

The records of the State Department show that the United States was the first country to make a treaty of any kind with Japan and the first to send a Minister there, Secretary of State Lewis Cass having sent Townsend Harris of New York as Consul-General and afterwards Minister to Japan in 1848. He made a treaty at Yeddo, which served as the basis for subsequent treatics with Great Britain, Prussia, France, Switzerland, and other countries. Japan now proposes to throw open its entire country to foreigners, asking only one reservation, against the alien ownership of land, similar to the laws in some American States.
